

The 2014 School Health Champion Awards

The California School-Based Health Alliance Board of Directors has launched an annual awards program to recognize advocates who work tirelessly to bring health care to kids at school. We applaud all of the dedicated school health practitioners and advocates who are helping ensure that every kid gets the chance to be healthy and successful. For 2014, we are proud to honor three champions for their outstanding contributions advancing school health through practice, policy, and school leadership.



Outstanding Practitioner: Jenn Rader

In 1998, Jenn Rader, a high school history teacher, founded the James Morehouse Project to bring much-needed support to students and families at El Cerrito High School. In the years since, the school-based health center has grown to offer a rich array of services. Jenn has been on the cutting edge of working with teachers and administrators to foster a positive school climate and to find new ways to support youth and realize their potential. She has elevated the leadership of her students through statewide advocacy. Throughout it all, she has shared her expertise with others - from colleagues and teachers to legislators and advocates from across the state.



School District Leader: Robert Frausto

Kerman Unified School District Superintendent Robert Frausto has been one of the Central Valley's strongest voices in support of improving children's health to achieve academic success. As the Superintendent of a small school district, Robert was instrumental in advocating for school-based health care for his pupils. Since his district's school-based health center has opened, he has continued to work to maximize its impact. Beyond his district, Robert has advocated for school-based health in a region where there are often obstacles to funding and support. Central Valley educators and health providers agree: Robert is one of California's strongest champions for school-based health.



Legislative Champion: Representative Lois Capps

As the Democratic representative of California's 24th Congressional District, Rep. Lois Capps has championed school-based health care in California and nationwide. Her two decades' experience as a former nurse and public health advocate for the Santa Barbara School District has informed her work in Congress on behalf of schoolchildren. She authored the original bill to authorize a program to fund school-based health centers that was incorporated into the Affordable Care Act of 2010, and has now authored another bill to re-authorize this bill after the original sunsets. We honor Rep. Capps for her steadfast commitment to school-based health care in California and the U.S.




