



Contraceptive Options


- Long-Acting Reversible Contraceptives
 - Intra-uterine device (IUD)
 - Implant
- Hormonal Methods
 - IUDs
 - Implant
 - Injection/Shot
 - Oral Contraceptives
 - Patch
 - Ring
- Barrier Methods (Non-Hormonal)
- Fertility Awareness-Based



Long-Acting Reversible Contraceptives

Intrauterine Devices (IUDs)

Hormonal & Non-Hormonal (Cooper)








Long-Acting Reversible Contraceptives

Nexplanon

• 3 years







Hormonal Contraceptives

Injection

• Every 3 months





Hormonal Contraceptives

Oral Contraceptive/"birth control pill"

Take 1 pill daily





Hormonal Methods

Contraceptive Patches

• Change every week x3 weeks then no patch for 1 week





Hormonal Methods

Contraceptive Ring

Stays inside for 3 weeks and no ring for 1 week





Barrier Methods

Condoms

- Female
- Male

- Diaphragm
- Cervical caps













How Well Does Birth Control Work?





Emergency Contraceptive (EC)



- Paraguard/Copper IUD
- One dose pill –
 "morning after pill"




Myths on EC

- It causes abortion
 - EC does not cause abortion. It prevents pregnancy from occurring & will not work if you are already pregnant
- It only works the morning after
 - Ideally the sooner the better, however it can be taken up 5 days after depending on the type.
- There is only one type of EC
 - There are 2 pills and 1 IUD
- You need a prescription from your doctor to get it
 - Pills are available over the counter
- It is always effective
 - Unfortunately, not, it is most effective if take 12-24 hours from unprotected intercourse but are less effective the longer you wait.
- You are protected for the rest of your cycle
 - It does not, if you have unprotected sex again prior to your period
- It will still work if you vomit after
 - If you vomit within 3 hours of taking it, you may need a further dose. Please contact a medical provider
- It increases my risk of infertility if taken too often
 - Studies have not demonstrated there is any long-term effects on fertility
- It increases the risk of ectopic pregnancy
 - There is no evidence that EC pills increase risk of ectopic pregnancy



How effective is EC



- IUD approx. 99% effective
- Pills 75-89% effective



Which one is most effective?

- Paraguard IUD "copper IUD" (most effective of all)
- Ulipristal pill








How does the IUD work as EC

- It should be inserted <u>within 5 days</u> of having unprotected sex.
- Decreases sperm's ability to fertilize the egg.
- Can use it for long-term birth control for up to 10 years (some studies have noted effectiveness until 12 years)





How does the EC pill work

It works by delaying ovulation





How much does the EC cost?

- Emergency contraceptive is covered by most insurance
- Family Pact program covers
- Over the counter cost range from approx. \$12 \$50
- IUD covered by most insurance & Family Pact
